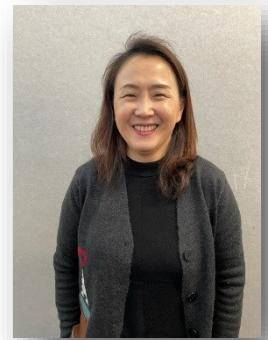

INNOVATIONS IN CARS FOR A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

Why are innovations in cars important for a sustainable future?

In Australia, 91% of households own at least one vehicle. Most cars now still run on petrol or diesel engines. It is important to use technology to make cars that use less fuel and are better for the environment so children like us will be able to grow up to enjoy a nice clean future.

Sustainable energy sources

Electric cars can be charged at a charging station or your house.

- They draw energy from power plants that burn fossil fuels. One day, more places will switch to **renewable energy sources** like wind, solar and hydropower so electric cars will be even more sustainable.

When the car brakes, the motor becomes a generator. Electrical energy is used instead to charge the battery.

Battery is recharged when the car brakes.

Figure 4. How the motor works

Electricity turns the wire coil into an electromagnet. The permanent magnet turns as it is attracted and repelled by the electromagnet. (Figure 4)

Sustainable car parts

Right now car bodies and parts are not being reused.

- When a car is scrapped, only the valuable parts are reused. The rest of the parts like steel, rubber, plastics, glass and leather can be recycled but rarely made into new cars.
- Scientists are finding out a new way called **circular manufacturing** - building cars with parts that can be reused to make new cars.
- They also want to make cars that last longer and use less fuel so that we do not need to keep making new cars and using new materials to do so.

Sustainable car technology: Electric and hybrid cars

Have you wondered why some cars don't make any sound? This is how they are electric!

- Electric cars (Figure 1) run on lithium-ion batteries which can be recharged.
- They also have **regenerative braking** (Figure 2): the car recovers energy when it brakes.
- Hybrid cars (Figure 3) run on petrol and electricity. They have more car parts than the electric car, for example, a fuel tank and a catalytic converter. The exhaust system reduces the harmful gases given out by the car that hurt the environment.

Innovation For a Sustainable Future By Xavier

Introduction

Energy conservation can be accomplished by using more energy effectively, with less energy overall and less usage of conventional energy sources, such as oil and greenhouse gases (Department of Energy, n.d.). The earth relies on many things, but we humans use resources and non-environmentally friendly strategies, such as oil, gas, and CO₂ (Carbon dioxide). Therefore, in this project, we will explore the solutions to reduce climate change before it's too late.

ENERGY-EFFICIENT WATER HEATER

The energy-efficient water heater mainly consists of a storage tank and a heat pump that uses no carbon and instead solar energy.

Usage of electricity and how to minimize it

The average person usually uses 15,000 kw/h. Strategies to be cost-efficient and energy-efficient (Department of Energy, 2019).

- Renewable Energy:** Using solar panels and wind turbines to harness clean, renewable energy sources and reduce reliance on fossil fuels.
- Energy Storage:** Advanced battery technologies, such as lithium-ion batteries, that store excess energy generated from renewable sources for use during low-production periods.
- Electric Vehicles:** The development of rechargeable batteries reduces greenhouse gas emissions and dependence on fossil fuels.

Significance and Impact

Climate change can be tackled just from small things (Rainick et al., 2022):

- Planting a few trees.
- Switching to electric vehicles.
- Using less hot water.
- Changing a lightbulb to a compact fluorescent light.

Carbon dioxide is the main component of climate change and pollution, so we must reduce it. In fact, one tree would absorb 1 ton of carbon in its lifetime! Replacing one regular light bulb with a compact fluorescent light bulb will save 150 pounds of carbon dioxide (Northwestern University, n.d.)

BRIAN'S SMART HOME

Most houses emit a lot of carbon, from things to your heat pump, showers and even your light bulbs, why we need to keep our house energy efficient, just like Brian's house.

Smart energy-efficient thermostat. Improved insulation. Air sealing and weatherstripping. Appliances that use less energy and water.

ENERGY-EFFICIENT BATTERY POWER

This energy-efficient battery uses lithium ions to power the battery, whereas normal batteries use electric carbon energy, and as it said before, carbon is not environmentally friendly.

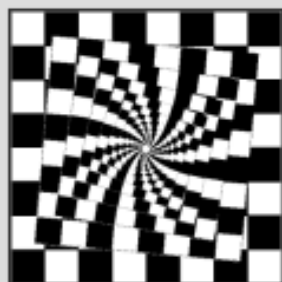
